



Governors


- Cheadle Catholic Infant School is a Voluntary Aided School and its Governing Body consists of both elected and appointed governors.

What is the Early Years Foundation Stage?

 The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS.) is the stage of education for children from birth to the end of the Reception year.

 It is based on the recognition that children learn best through play and active learning.

EYFS

"Every child deserves the best possible start in life and support to fulfil their potential. Children develop quickly in the early years and a child's experience between birth and age 5 has a major impact on their future life chances. A secure, safe and happy childhood is important in it's own right and it provides the foundation for children to make the most of their abilities and talents as they grow up."

(Statutory framework for EYFS 2021)

Prime Areas of Learning

Every day our children are given the opportunity to be an artist, writer, mathematician, engineer, designer or story teller to name but a few!








Reading & writing are promoted throughout all areas of provision.

 - Create a 'buzz' about reading around the school.






Why is reading for pleasure such an important part of school life?

Research shows that children who read for pleasure...

- Find it easier to empathise with others, improves wellbeing and builds more positive relationships (Reading Agency 2015).
- Have a positive attitude to reading means young people are more likely to read at/ above expected age level (Clark 2014).
- Have a richer vocabulary at their disposal and often also do better in other academic areas such as spelling and maths (Sullivan and Brown 2013).
- Are more likely to be readers throughout their adult lives (Clark and Rumbold 2006)

We use many different materials for our artwork.


Construction ----We plan, design and build our own models. We also also create big building outside.






We act out lots of stories and pretend to be different characters. We always have our home corner to play with.







FOREST SCHOOLS:

Forest School offers ALL learners regular opportunities to achieve and develop confidence and self-esteem through hands- on learning experiences in a woodland or natural environment with trees. Forest School is a specialised learning approach that sits within and complements the wider context of outdoor and woodland education.























Independence

- To encourage your child to be more independent please ensure the following:
- All clothing / shoes to be clearly named.
- Water bottles clearly marked.
- To be toilet trained, including wiping themselves.
- •To be able to fasten coats etc.
- No jewellery / hair tied back.

Being Healthy

We are a 'Healthy School' and promote healthy eating, sport and outdoor activities as well as the importance of rest/sleep to equip children with the skills, knowledge and understanding they need to live a healthy balanced life.



We were the Stockport 'Smile For a Mile' School of the Year 2020 and runners up in 2021. All children run a mile a day.

We do not allow confectionery or crisps at break time. Your child may bring a healthy snack to eat at morning break e.g. fruit, crackers or vegetables

Every child will receive a piece of free fruit in the afternoon.

Until the age of 5 your child is also offered free milk in school every day.





Water can only be brought into school in a plastic sports bottle i.e. with push down tops for drinking during the day (**clearly marked with your child's name**.) these bottles will be kept in separate boxes to prevent any spillages.

Extra Funding For School.

Pupil Premium

If your child is eligible for 'free school meals' and you register them for this, we'll receive extra funding called 'pupil premium'. We use this extra money to mprove the educational provision and resources at the school.

What is pupil premium funding?

Pupil premium funding from the government is given to schools to help pupils reach their full potential, regardless of their background or financial situation. It's provided for pupils who:

Are registered for free school meals

Have been registered for free school meals at any point in the past 6 years Are, or have been, in care

Have parents in the armed forces

At Cheadle Catholic Infant School, we get an extra £1385 per child (these figures are for the 2022/23 financial year) for every eligible pupil who is registered for free school meals. This extra money could make a real difference to the quality of education we offer.

English as an additional language: EAL

A pupil is recorded as having English as an additional language if she/he is exposed to a language at home that is known or believed to be other than English. DfE 2020

Even if a child speaks English but hears other languages at home they are EAL.

Diocesan Building Fund:

£15 per year per child

NURSERY FUND

At the start of each half term, we collect a voluntary Nursery fund £6.00 (equal to around £1 per week of each half term).

This fund covers a variety of items, such as: baking sessions; extras for special activities; forest school resources; and excessive wear and tear on Nursery equipment.

Under the Education Reform Act we are not able to ask for payment towards such activities but any voluntary contributions help us to maintain and support a hugely engaging environment for the children. If you would like to contribute, please do so using Parent Pay

Medical Matters

•Any sickness, diarrhoea, must be followed by 48 hrs clear absence.

•Any absence requires an email to admin or telephone call explaining why.

•Head lice are common! Please check regularly and treat as recommended.

•Any medicines can only be administered by prior arrangement

How can I help my child prepare for school

- Toileting:- Unless there is a medical or special need we expect all children to be toilet trained & to be able to attend to their own needs when using the toilet. Ofcourse children will be assisted if they have an 'accident.' If 'accidents' are persistent you will be asked to meet with the Headteacher.
