





Stockport Family at Cheadle Catholic Schools

What is the Early Years Foundation Stage?

 The Early Years Foundation Stage (E.Y.F.S.) is the stage of education for children from birth to the end of the Reception year.

 It is based on the recognition that children learn best through play and active learning.

EYFS

"Every child deserves the best possible start in life and support to fulfil their potential. Children develop quickly in the early years and a child's experience between birth and age 5 has a major impact on their future life chances. A secure, safe and happy childhood is important in it's own right and it provides the foundation for children to make the most of their abilities and talents as they grow up."

(Statutory framework for EYFS 2021)



The E.Y.F.S. is based on 4 themes

- 1 A Unique Child
- 2 Positive Relationships
- 3 Enabling Environments with teaching & support from adults
- 4 Learning and Development

At CCIS we passionately believe that young children learn best through play and exploration. Wherever possible we offer children the opportunity to experience real life events that are linked to their learning.

Every day our children are given the opportunity to be an artist, writer, mathematician, engineer, designer or story teller to name but a few!







These play based activities enable the children to consolidate their skills, knowledge and understanding and enable them to become independent and resilient learners.

Throughout the environment, both inside and outside, you will see busy children actively engaged in a range of different activities.

Reading for Pleasure

Parents are a child's first educators. We know that children who see their parents and caregivers reading at home are much more likely to view it as a pleasurable activity and be more motivated to read themselves







Why is reading for pleasure such an important part of school life?

Research shows that children who read for pleasure...

- Find it easier to empathise with others, improves wellbeing and builds more positive relationships (Reading Agency 2015).
- Have a positive attitude to reading means young people are more likely to read at/above expected age level (Clark 2014).
- Have a richer vocabulary at their disposal and often also do better in other academic areas such as spelling and maths (Sullivan and Brown 2013).
- Are more likely to be readers throughout their adult lives (Clark and Rumbold 2006)

FOREST SCHOOL:

At Cheadle Catholic Infant School, our Forest School provision provides nurturing, positive outdoor learning experiences to support our children's wellbeing and personal development. Children learn about the natural environment, how to handle risks and how to use their own initiative to solve problems and co-operate with others. Children participating in Forest School have the opportunity to explore, play, learn boundaries of behaviour and develop life-long skills such a confidence, resilience, independence and motivation, whilst making links to the curriculum.









Independence

- To make your child more independent please ensure the following:
 - All clothing / shoes to be clearly named.
 - · Water bottles clearly marked.
 - School bags could have a key ring on to identify their bag (no rucksacks as our classroom space is very limited)
 - To be able to dress / undress themselves especially in preparation for P.E.
 - To be toilet trained
 - •To be able to fasten coats etc.
 - No jewellery / hair tied back.

 Toileting:- Unless there is a medical or special need we expect all children to be toilet trained & to be able to attend to their own needs when using the toilet. Ofcourse children will be assisted if they have an 'accident.' If 'accidents' are persistent you will be asked to meet with the Headteacher.

 Parking:- Parking is not permitted on the school site at any time unless dropping off or picking up from Breakfast or After School Clubs. Please obey the speed limit of 20mph on Conway Rd

Beginning September 2014, the Government provides funding for school meals for children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 - now known as Universal Infant Free School Meals (UIFSM).

Being Healthy

We are a 'Healthy School' and promote healthy eating, sport and outdoor activities as well as the importance of rest/sleep to equip

children with the skills, knowledge and understanding they need

to live a healthy balanced life.

All children run a mile a day.

We do not allow confectionery or crisps at break time.

Your child may bring a healthy snack to eat at morning break e.g. fruit, crackers or vegetables

Every child will receive a piece of free fruit in the afternoon.





Water can only be brought into school in a plastic sports bottle i.e. with push down tops for drinking during the day (clearly marked with your child's name.) these bottles will be kept in separate boxes to prevent any spillages.

We are passionate about developing happy and healthy children who will go on to thrive in their future education. We encourage healthy lifestyles and promote exercise and fitness in school.



Breakfast Club & After School Club

Our BREAKFAST and CASCADE Clubs will continue for the next academic year and will open again on:-

Monday 5th September, 2022.

Breakfast Club and CASCADE club will be available for children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 classes only.

Breakfast Club fees are £5.50 per session, per child.

CASCADE fees are as follows:-

3.30pm - 4.30pm (1hr) £5.50

4.30 pm- 6.00pm (after a sports club) £7.50

3.30 pm- 6.00pm (full session) £12.50
